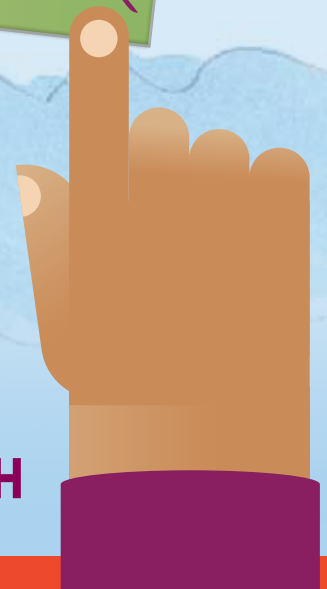
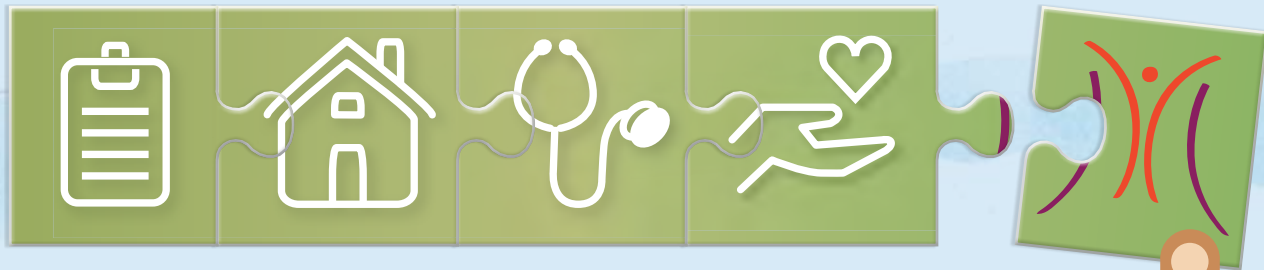

LGBTQ HEALTH AND WELL-BEING

We've had much to report in recent years about growth. Many factors have contributed to this, but most significant is the Affordable Care Act. Since its launch the ACA has dramatically reduced the number of uninsured lesbian, gay, and bisexual (LGB) people, and by removing the ban on pre-existing conditions, enabled people with HIV to obtain health insurance for the first time; significant expansion in insurance coverage of transgender related medical care will enable many to live a fuller life in their true gender.

The introduction of pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) has had huge implications for HIV prevention, and we now have over 600 patients in our care who are taking PrEP. Thanks to a major CDC grant, we're able to initiate a Community PrEP Clinic to provide individuals, especially youth at high risk for HIV, with access to PrEP.

These are exciting developments, but the growth of so many programs has maxed out our physical capacity at both 809 Locust and 21 S. 12th Streets. Client waiting areas are crowded, and new patients are faced with a three-month wait for their first appointment.

That's why we are thrilled to share that in summer 2017 Mazzoni Center will move into a new home at Broad and Bainbridge Streets. We will consolidate our programs under one roof, double our capacity for medical and mental health, and launch the region's first intensive outpatient LGBTQ program for substance abuse. Patients will not only avoid long waiting periods, they'll enjoy enhanced coordination of care and far greater convenience, with all of our programs and services housed in one place.

None of this would be possible without the continued support of individuals, corporate partners and foundations. We are deeply grateful for your past contributions, and ask that your help us realize our vision and become a major gift supporter. 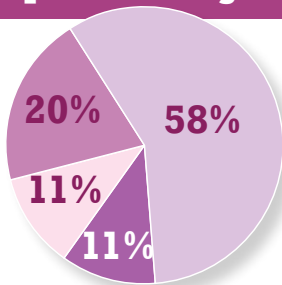
## HIV PREVENTION & TESTING

Our **outreach team** made **21,000 individual contacts**, and distributed **192,000 condoms** and **safer sex kits** in FY2016.

### NAVIGATION SERVICES

With grant funding from the CDC and support from the Philadelphia Department of Public Health, Mazzoni will launch an exciting new program in Fall 2016 focused on providing navigation services to men of color who have sex with men, as well as transgender women of color, who are HIV negative. Our aim is to help people at high risk of acquiring HIV maintain their negative status by improving access to PrEP and addressing key social determinants of health such as education, employment, housing, mental health, and substance abuse.

\*MSM = men who have sex with men



Mazzoni Center provided **6,656 rapid HIV tests** at our **Washington West Project**, which is open six days a week for walk-in screenings and meetings with our knowledgeable counseling team.

<b>3,370</b>	of those we tested were MSM.
<b>68</b>	people tested positive for HIV at Washington West.
<b>60</b>	of those people were MSM.
<b>82%</b>	of those who tested positive were between the ages of 18 and 34.
<b>72%</b>	of MSM who tested positive were African-American or Latino.

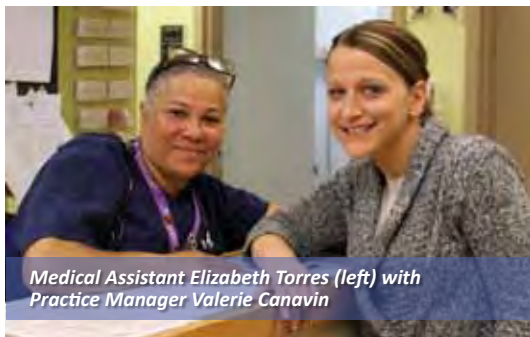

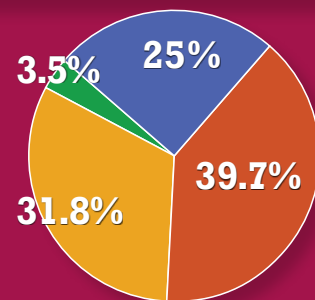
## How our patients self-identify by gender

Mazzoni Center Family & Community Medicine had **9,369 active patients** in FY2016, who made a total of **21,784 visits**.

Achieving an undetectable viral load is the ultimate goal in medical treatment of HIV, because it not only promotes the health and longevity of the patient, it also virtually eliminates the risk of transmitting the virus to another person. Nationally, the CDC estimates that 60% of people living with HIV have reached this benchmark.



In FY2016 we provided medical care for **973 people** living with HIV, 85% of whom had an **undetectable viral load**.

## BEHAVIORAL HEALTH INTEGRATION IN PRIMARY CARE MEDICINE

LGBTQ individuals are disproportionately affected by mental health issues and less likely to seek treatment. Since 2014 our Behavioral Health Consultant has served as an integral member of Mazzone Center's primary care team. Our BHC offers support for patients experiencing a range of psychosocial or emotional issues: depression, panic, anxiety, anger management, relationship conflicts, disturbed sleep, smoking cessation, as well as substance abuse and dependence.

Since the program's start in June 2014, our BHC has met with over **1,000** patients, for a total of **3,135** individual sessions.



To date, **over 10%** of our active patient population in primary care has benefited from **BHC services.**

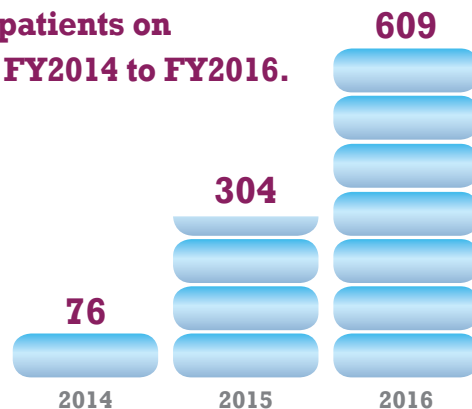
During fiscal year 2016, we provided BHC services to **544 patients** through **1,459** documented sessions.



## CONNECTING PEOPLE TO PrEP

Through our medical practice and the work of our HIV prevention and outreach teams, Mazzone Center has intensified our efforts at connecting people at high risk of HIV with PreExposure Prophylaxis, commonly referred to as "PrEP." PrEP has become a transformational tool in preventing HIV infection, with 99% success rates in study after study since it was introduced.

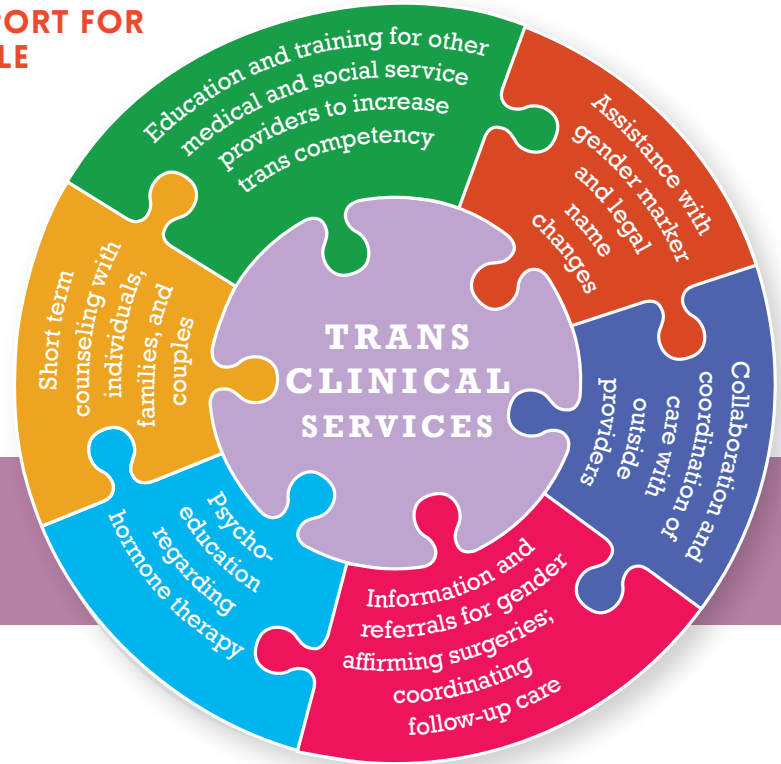

## KNOWLEDGEABLE, AFFIRMING CARE AND SUPPORT FOR TRANS AND GENDER NONCONFORMING PEOPLE

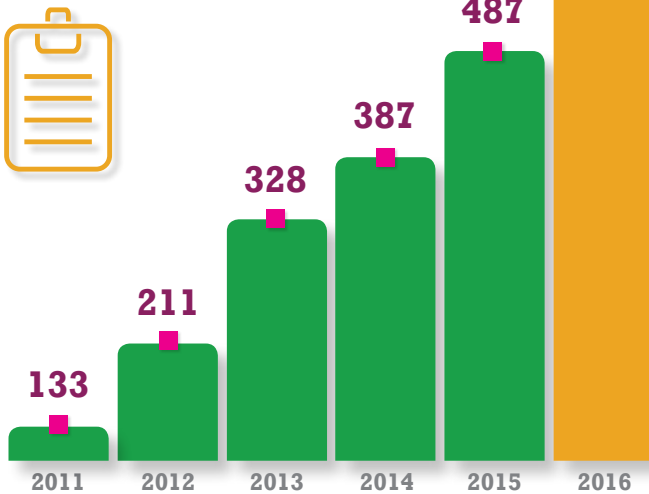
Mazzoni Center continues to be a national leader in the provision of quality, patient-centered care for trans and gender nonconforming individuals of all ages.

We provided 2,338 adult patients with trans care services in FY2016, up 115% from last year.



## New patient intakes

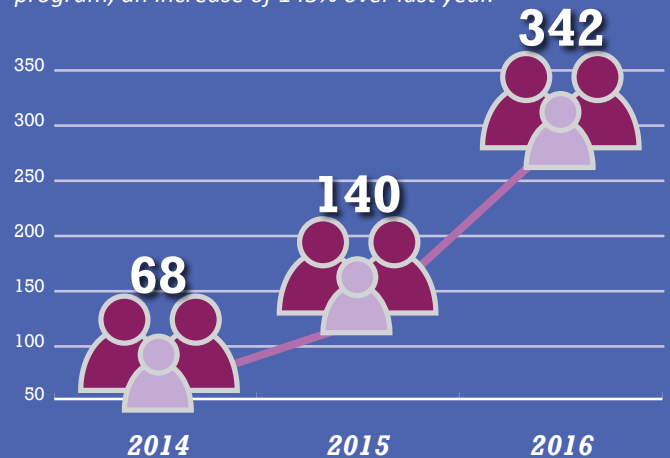
Our Trans Care Services team provided 559 adult intake assessments in FY2016, an increase of 15% over last year.

## TRANS CARE STORIES

**Graduate student Abby Roh** describes her internship experience working alongside the Trans Care team at Mazzoni Center Family & Community Medicine as both an education and an inspiration.



“It’s been incredible,” Abby says, “Especially to see what trans care services is doing at Mazzoni, in building an informed consent model of care for patients, and honoring their autonomy as individuals who can make choices for themselves about their health and their identity.”

A typical day for Abby involved meeting new patients for their intake appointments. She helped prepare gender marker change letters, drafting and getting them signed by a medical provider so that patients could access forms of legal ID to match their gender identity. She also provided short term counseling for new patients who came in to start care with us, but were lacking in support from family or friends. “Sometimes I was helping to get them connected to longer term counseling services or support groups, other times I was helping them to build coping skills,” she says.

When a person who has struggled with gender identity for years comes to a place like Mazzoni Center for care, and finds themselves in a supportive environment, Abby says it’s a powerful thing to witness. “People just light up,” she says, “when they realize: I can finally be who I’ve known myself to be all along.”

## MAKING AN IMPACT ON PHILLY YOUTH

In July 2016 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) issued a groundbreaking report indicating that lesbian, gay, and bisexual students experience substantially higher levels of physical and sexual violence and bullying than other students - placing them at significant risk of suicide, depression, addiction, poor academic performance, and other serious consequences. Mazzoni Center has been working with students in the Philadelphia Public School system since 1997 to address these issues, and help create safe and welcoming school environments for all youth. This year alone:

- We presented 190 interactive educational workshops to 1,658 students at city schools.
- Our Ally Safe Schools program reached 451 students through GSA (Gay Straight Alliance) visits.
- Our Citywide GSA network engaged with 45 individual schools.

Our Weekly Youth Drop-In clinic, which takes place Wednesday evenings from 5-7 p.m. at Mazzoni Center Family & Community Medicine, provided care for 591 unduplicated youth (aged 14-24) who made a total of 793 visits in FY2016.

All told, our case managers worked with 1,602 youth patients in FY2016, connecting them with medical referrals, mental health support, educational/vocational, housing or legal assistance, and other resources as needed.

## LGBTQ AFFIRMING BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES

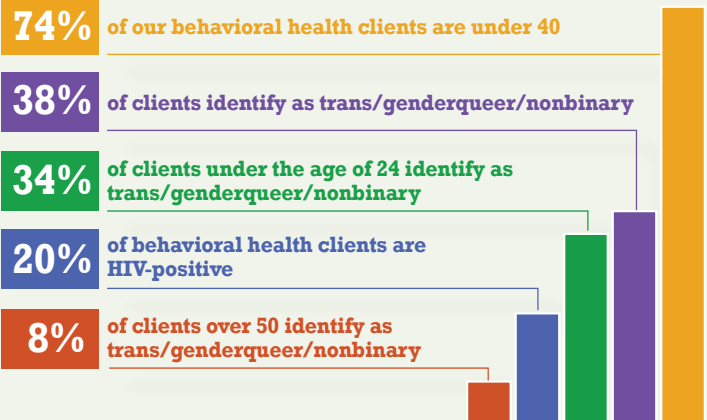
With 46% of clients presenting some form of substance abuse/misuse at intake, treating people for addiction is a critical focus of our work. This year we introduced a Certified Recovery Specialist to provide additional one-on-one recovery counseling and group facilitation. The CRS tapped into an unmet need in our behavioral health program, and gave us a flexible and highly individualized tool to address the broad scope of recovery needs - at no cost to our clients.

As we look ahead to next year and the launch of Mazzone Center's Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) -- which will be the first and only such program in the region developed specifically for LGBTQ individuals -- our Certified Recovery Specialist will play an integral role.

## LGBTQ LEGAL SERVICES

We understand that equal rights and fair policies are essential to a person's health and well-being. Mazzoni Center's legal services department is the only program in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania that specifically provides direct no-cost or low-cost legal assistance to low-income and lower-income, underserved LGBTQ populations. Through educating and training members of the

public, the legal profession, employers, and service providers about the laws prohibiting discrimination against LGBTQ people, we also work to reduce discrimination and other barriers to employment or to participation in civic life so that LGBTQ people can contribute fully to their workplace and their community, and obtain culturally competent and inclusive insurance coverage and healthcare.

**Our food bank** serves low-income, **HIV-positive Philadelphians**, providing them with consistent access to healthy food. This year we **distributed 11,507 bags** of groceries to **1,268 households.**



Our housing program provided rental assistance to **169 households in FY2016** - including **203 adults** and **43 children.**

Thanks to outstanding feedback from landlords and consistent success of program participants, our housing program was allotted **65 additional slots** and grew **more than 50%** over last year.



**Case managers** assist **HIV-positive clients** with medical appointments and referrals, housing and employment concerns, and other needs that may **impact their health and well-being.**

## EXPANDING CULTURAL COMPETENCE THROUGHOUT THE REGION

Mazzoni Center's Professional Development Program offered trainings and workshops to 3,442 individuals in FY2016.

This was a 51% increase from the previous year.

Our Professional Development Team completed a record 100 LGBTQ cultural competency trainings for medical providers, medical students, behavioral health providers, social work students, K-12 staff, and university staff.

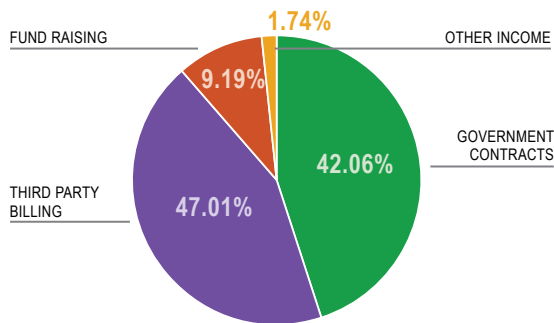

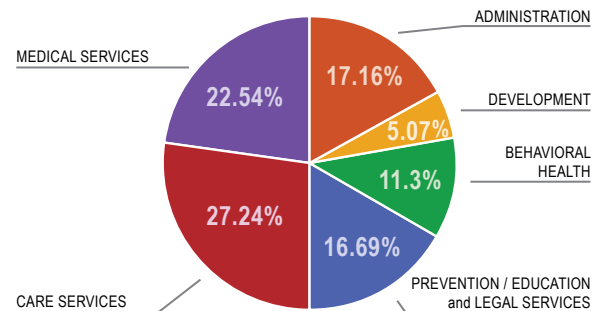
